
 Member of the Florida Bar for at least 5 years (10 years for appellate judges)

Election

- Candidates may qualify for an election by petition or by a filing fee.
 - For petition, candidates are required to obtain signatures from registered voters on the candidate petition form. The number of signatures necessary is equal to 1% of the registered voters in the geographical area for the immediately preceding general election.








Appointment

- Upon notification of a vacancy, the Governor requests the Chair of the JNC to convene the JNC for the purpose of selecting and submitting names of qualified individuals to the Governor for appointment to the bench.
- The JNC investigates each applicant to confirm eligibility.
 Eligible applicants interview with the JNC, which then determines by majority vote which applicants to recommend to the Governor for his consideration.
- The JNC has no more than sixty days from the time it is requested to convene to nominate no fewer than three and no more than six applicants to the Governor. The Governor has sixty days to appoint a judge from among the nominees.
