

To the Orange and Osceola County Community:

The mission of Florida's judicial branch is to protect rights and liberties, uphold and interpret the law, and provide for the peaceful resolution of disputes. To support this mission, the Trial Court Budget Commission's 2020-21 Legislative Budget Requests seek additional resources related to the timely resolution of cases and the provision of court interpreting services.

Accelerated, sustained, long term growth in our region makes the pursuit of these issues a priority for the Ninth Judicial Circuit. Complex civil cases, like those involving businesses, guardians, family issues, and domestic violence injunctions, require a tremendous amount of time and resources. Additional judges are still needed. And, staff attorneys and case managers play a vital support role-multiplying the efforts of a presiding judge, increasing the number of cases the judge is able to handle, and assisting in the more timely resolution of those cases.

Central Florida's diverse population growth has also put a strain on court interpreting services. Our court users with limited English proficiency who struggle to speak the language or to understand fully their proceedings can only access justice via court interpreters. By law, the Court provides interpreters in multiple languages for our due process courts - criminal, juvenile, domestic violence, and mental health. Although the Ninth Judicial Circuit leads the state in use of technology to maximize interpretation services, additional resources are essential to serve our rapidly growing population.














CIRCUIT COURT GROWTH TRENDS









PROBATE GUARDIANSHIP MENTAL HEALTH FILINGS
